We oversaw the separation of assets and liabilities, hired an exceptional Business Manager in Taylor Ogilvie, raised the profile and support of our exceptional Head of School, JJ Morrow, reviewed all aspects of the school's financial position, enlarged the membership of the Board, and set in motion a hefty workload to fulfill the vision of the school.

CELEBRATING 40 YEARS MACKINTOSH 1977–2017



The 2017-2018 school year represented our campus' 7th birthday on South Boulder Road, but our school's 40th birthday as we honored our roots as Colorado's first school for gifted learners. Mack Boulder is fortunate to be able to pay tribute to decades of mission driven work by our sister campus in Littleton which led to the establishment of our Boulder campus. We are thankful for our partnership as we learn and grow together through our shared mission.

This Impact Report will highlight some aspects of the 2017-2018 school year for which our community is most proud.

+80% growth: Our campus reached our sustainable goal of +150 students. Full homerooms support robust learning and social groups and afforded us the financial security to expand faculty/staff and programming. Growth also allowed us to continue work towards creating more diverse and balanced homeroom communities.

Teachers: students = exceptional: Ratios matter. Our faculty/staff expanded to include a Middle School Director, MYP Coordinator, two teachers in every homeroom, full time Design/Innovation Specialist, Outreach Coordinator, Literacy Coordinator/Coach,



and Technology Coordinator. These positions support both faculty and students by providing exceptional ratios for learning.

Work that is never done: Great schools never stop working to improve curriculum and teaching practices. Here's a partial list of what has kept us busy this school year: aligning and strengthening K-8 literacy instruction, pedagogy, and assessments; expanding and aligning K-8 science; adopting new K-8 math instruction; redesigning and aligning our K-5 Units of Inquiry; rewriting and aligning Middle Years Programme (MYP) academics; expanding Design and Performing Arts programming; and redesigning our entire schedule...twice.

Nifty to be 50: Our Middle School team worked hard to create/design: a MS identity; grade-level homerooms each led by two teachers; Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) support via homerooms and houses; increased academic support and elective choices via Friday Labs; experiential fall and curriculum-focused spring trips; and meaningful service learning opportunities. Our Middle School population grew 14% this year climbing ever closer to a nifty 50.

Building our future: Plans for a new +9000 sq. ft. building took shape alongside a sizable future capital campaign we dubbed Quantum. A dedicated MackVestment Team worked tirelessly to balance strategies to develop support for faculty/staff, the new building, and permanently



endowing Mack Scholars. After a thorough and lengthy planning phase with our entire community, we completed our building designs with HCM Architects and started our formal expansion meetings with the County.

Stand By Our People: Our Stand By Mack Spring Auction featured a Live Appeal that focused on raising support for Mack Scholars and faculty/staff. Our community raised an astounding \$154,000 towards both groups. For faculty/staff, the Appeal funded: doubling paid time off, doubling FMLA leave pay, hiring

a super sub, increased professional development funding, and providing math coaching.

Reaching out to serve. Our 2020 Strategic Plan identified a key area of our mission where we needed to "walk the talk." Thanks to planning, networking, and some pretty cool new buses (thank you, 2017 auction, Macknifique!) we increased our experiential education trips by 96% to date and blew the roof off service learning connections and experiences.

Worth the price of admission. Association of Colorado Independent School membership provided countless benefits to our continuing growth and stability, as well as a network of professional support for our administration and Board. This year we also prepared for our IB self-study - a process which helps us improve almost every area of curriculum and instruction. It takes dedication to be an IB World School, and there are many benefits.

Independence by Design: For many years our Boulder and Littleton campuses shared just about everything from curriculum to a business office. During my first 3-4 years as Head we have worked steadily to peel away some of the dependent layers to allow both campuses the space and freedom to grow with increased independence. During the 17/18 school year our Board and administrations worked collaboratively to pave the way for corporate restructuring as the first step towards establishing independence in finances, liability, and governance.

In Boulder, we devoted much of the spring to forming the on-ramp for a new business office, complete with new financials and a business manager position. We invested in professional help from several expert consultants and accountants to help with each of these important threads. By

the end of the 17/18 school year we were ready to "open for business" with an accurate balance sheet, independent chart of accounts, a new space, and an exceptional Business Manager who hit the ground running in June.

The 2017-2018 school year was a time of appreciating the past, engaging with the present, and embracing a vibrant future for our unique school. We left the year feeling grounded in ways that have allowed the next phases of dreaming to begin!





ADMISSIONS

Our Boulder Campus continued to thrive and started the 2017-2018 school year with an enrollment high of 150 students, adding 18 more students overall to the previous year. In the last four years, enrollment has grown over 80%. Reclaiming the 2500 sq ft previously leased by Hillside School allowed us to spread out and reconfigure the use of our entire campus this year. The flow of the school became more purposed as we created a Middle School wing and added a Lower School Science Lab, Spanish classroom, Middle School Hub and a multi-use room known as the Hive. Re-enrollment for the 2018-2019 school year with current families was strong, and we experienced record inquiries during the admissions season, with a goal of starting the year with 155 students.

Our second through fifth grades filled quickly, with only limited spots available after re-enrollment. Kindergarten inquiries were strong again this year, but we were unable to move forward with some applicants due to not having room for their siblings - mainly in second and third grades. Inquiries were steady and then especially heavy right before and after the BVSD open enrollment timeline. Similarly to previous years, March and April continued to bring in the highest number of inquiries. At this point in the year, most of our classes were full.

Our rate of parent tours to student visits grew even stronger to an **astounding 100%** and our rate of student visits to enrollment also **held strong at 34%**. This latter calculation is difficult to quantify, as we often had students visiting despite having no open spots for them. Parents were eager to have all pieces in place should a spot become available. After a busy season in admissions we opened our 2018-2019 school year with 153 students. We continued to draw in inquiring families through our admissions events: Saturday Kindergarten/1st grade Play Date, January Open House, STEAM Fest and a Genius Girls Gathering (GGG) event that brought in 17 girls from outside of Mack and landed a wonderful 8th grade girl. Our Mack Parent Council continued its amazing and dedicated work, organizing and running events that brought everyone together and strengthened our community.

Our strong tuition assistance program supported 37% of our families, opening the doors to a Mack education for many. Our Mack Scholars grant continued to provide ten students with full financial support to

attend Mack from entry grades through 8th grade. We believe strongly in the importance of a Mack education and are proud to lead area schools in tuition assistance. We greatly appreciate our community and thank our families, teachers and friends for supporting, standing behind and promoting the exciting work happening at Mack Boulder!

PROGRAM

Our dedicated team of teachers has worked hard to continue improving upon our practices as an International Baccalaureate World School. We balance the IB requirements with our commitment to social emotional growth and the specific needs of gifted children. We recently completed our IB self study which allowed us to reflect on and celebrate our accomplishments and plan for areas of growth. Through this process we have worked to refine our program, update many of our academic policies, and strengthen important teaching practices related to assessment, content, and service learning.

Our most significant curricular improvement this year was in our mathematics instruction. After a lengthy and thorough process of evaluation and exploring options,



we adopted Investigations for our Lower School math program. This curriculum focuses on building a strong foundation for mathematical understanding through inquiry based experiences that cultivate conceptual understanding. The program also provides opportunities for students to explain their thinking, thus building stronger mathematical vocabulary and articulation. In our Middle School we adopted the Illustrative Mathematics program for our students in 6th, 7th and 8th grade math, customizing a compacted curriculum so that all students complete Algebra 1 at the end of 8th grade at a minimum. This curriculum is a problem-based approach to math that develops students' mathematical thinking through questioning, discussion, and real-world contexts and connections. In addition to IM curriculum tasks, our students studying Algebra and Geometry use investigations from the Mathematics Vision Project curriculum and a traditional Pearson text. This combination of rich mathematical problems, investigations, and traditional curriculum prepares our students to reason, communicate, and think critically in the classroom and beyond.



On top of the planning for the shift in our mathematics instruction, a dedicated team of teachers helped revise our reading and writing scope and sequence for K-8. This work informed the revamping of our Primary Years Programme (PYP) continuums to reflect the developmental progression of reading and writing skills from kindergarten through 5th grade. These new continuums have helped us support our diverse array of learners by allowing teachers to clearly reflect on where students are currently and what the next steps for their growth should be. This work has also become an important tool for reporting student growth and areas of focus to parents and students.



As always, our students from K-8th grade displayed great success in all areas of the International Baccalaureate Learner Profiles. Our kindergarteners were communicators when they acted out, wrote, and adapted various fairy tales during their How We Express ourselves unit. Our first graders, were inquirers during their study of leaders. Through research they determined the qualities of a strong leader before creating lifesized model leaders that were shared with others. Our second graders demonstrated their commitment to caring for all living organisms by auctioning off works of art they created when studying biomimicry to raise money for Wild Animal Sanctuary. Third graders were **principled** in their study of economics when they hosted a charity market to support Ocean Conservancy. Our knowledgeable fourth graders explored the brain's functions and role in shaping our identity before sharing their exceptional understanding through an interactive brain museum. Our fifth graders were risk takers when they pitched business

plans to local investors and startup incubators while studying how economic principles drive entrepreneurship.

In middle school, our sixth graders showcased themselves as **thinkers** as they wrestled with the concepts surrounding the causes of the American Civil War and how this conflict shaped our young nation. The seventh grade practiced being **open minded** while studying world religions and visiting different places of worship to learn about how people express their faith. Eighth Graders exemplified being **reflective** as they completed their Community Project and looked back on the service work they contributed.

Our Middle School trip program continues to send our students out into the world beyond Mackintosh with trips to Salida, Crow Canyon Archaeology Center, Pine Ridge Reservation and Washington DC. These trips allow our students to practice being resilient in a diversity of situations ranging from team-building activities to direct service.





GIVING



Mack Boulder has been on an upward trajectory during the last five years building capacity in almost every facet of daily student life. As we continue to carve out our position as the leading progressive school in the Boulder area, we are shifting into a "build to last" mindset institutionally. To this end, we are working hard to find the optimal balance between yearly fundraising and tuition revenue in our upwards climb towards financial sustainability.

As with most independent schools, tuition alone doesn't cover the total cost of educating each student.

Our Board of Trustees works closely with our administration every year to make a Mack education affordable. In order to accomplish this, our annual budget has an intentional gap that needs to be closed through unrestricted giving. Our Annual Fund and Auction are the backbone of our unrestricted giving to help close that gap and build essential reserves. Donations to Mack Boulder impact every student and teacher in immediate, tangible ways and also help us with ongoing efforts to build to last. Since 2014-2015, we are proud of our 100% participation rate from current families, faculty, staff, and Board of Trustees.

Some of the major areas of operation that are supported by yearly giving include:

- Teacher support that is essential to attract, retain, and support teachers who care deeply about every Mack student.
- Small teaching ratios that provide the individual attention and support needed to thrive in our personalized educational setting.
- Vibrant IB programming that is augmented by innovative curriculum resources, field trips, and materials that support our progressive Visual and Performing Arts, Spanish, Design, Library, Physical Education, Social-Emotional Learning, and Science programs.
- Our commitment to diversity, including a robust Tuition Assistance engine that fuels our ability to attract and support families from a wide range of economic backgrounds.
- All elements of the annual budget that support the running of our campus, including: educational technology, classroom supplies, facilities and grounds upkeep, equipment repair and maintenance.

Mack Boulder also relies on the generous support of foundations and individual donors to feed our yearly restricted donation bucket. Our largest yearly contribution that directly impacts the







lives of ten current students is our Mack Scholars Grant (\$180,000/yr.). Due to the growing cost of supporting our Scholars, we also dedicated a portion of our auction's Live Appeal to raise gap funding for this program.


We also benefit mightily from our LeCiEL Professional Development Grant (\$35,000/yr.) which supports a myriad of opportunities for our hard working faculty and staff. In addition to supporting our yearly IB trainings, we sent faculty to Orton-Gillingham trainings, Globe Science Conference, Learning and the Brain Conference, Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL), Teacher's College Reading and Writing Program, November Learning workshop, and Illustrative Math Workshops (to name just a few).

Lastly, in 2017-2018 we also focused energies on building the onramp for our Quantum Capital Campaign which is largely focused on two major threads: supporting our faculty/staff, and raising the capital to expand our campus with a potential new +9000 sq. ft. building. In order to maximize our financial foundation as a school, we have been exploring a "win-win" approach to increasing support for faculty/staff by decreasing our debt. We are very excited to report that in the spring of 2018 we successfully paid off our \$250,000 Gill

Note, thanks to generous contributions from three major donors.

Thank you for your support as we continue to grow and strengthen our school. We think there is no greater return on donors' investments than happy, inspired, knowledgeable, and thriving students who have the skills and confidence needed to be their best selves and impact their future.
